KEEP EVERYONE IN THE CAR

A life ago, sometime between university and going to seminary, I spent three years living in Yellowknife in the Northwest Territories. During that time when I was "trying" on new expressions of spirituality, I belonged to a house church - a small, intimate group of Christians who had chosen an alternate style of "being church". Often we would spend the entire day together worshipping, studying, eating, and learning about each other's struggles.

It's harder for older children to be enthused about such a church when it means they are the only person in their peer group. So it was for my friend's daughter, Sarah. She was a young teen, only 13 or 14 years old.

One Sunday Pete, my friend along with his wife and Sarah picked me up to take me to the house church. I didn't have a car when I lived in the north. Per usual, Sarah was ranting in anticipation of another long, boring day. Pete became so frustrated with her comments that he turned around.

Once in his driveway he said, "Sarah, please get out of the car. I can't listen to your complaining any longer."

"Don't be dumb, Dad. We're going to church," she replied.

"Yes, but you are not coming with us," he retorted. And we sat there until Sarah got out of the car.

As I watched her go, I looked at Pete's face in the rear view mirror. His heart was breaking into a thousand pieces.

Five minutes after we arrived at the house church, he was back in his car on the way home. Peter later told me of his conversation with Sarah.

After apologizing to Sarah, they talked. She explained how hard the house church was for her. She had no one there her age. She believed in God and wanted to worship but the house church wasn't meeting her need.

Pete, along with his wife's blessing, offered to go to a "regular" church

with her on Sunday morning where it might be easier. They went together as a family and eventually joined that congregation. It was a good church home for them.

At Pentecost, which this year is May 15, we celebrate the birth of the church and the gift of the Holy Spirit. Since that first Pentecost we sometimes have worked hard at prescribing for each other how we must be that church or receive that Spirit. "Do it my way or get out of the car," we sometimes seem to say.

My Pentecost prayer is that we will respect all those who travel toward God whatever their route. We are called to be inviting, not demanding. Let's all stay in the car.

At the end of the meeting, Synod Council members threw money on the table and \$50 was raised – that's enough to plant 50 trees!

In April, Synod Council members again pulled out their wallets, this time in support of the 500 scholarships in ELCJHL schools. Over \$375 was raised!

The Eastern Synod Scholarship started about twenty years ago from the vision of one individual, namely Mr. Carl Dare. His desire was to help Lutheran youth to achieve higher education. In fact, Mr. Dare provided 99.9% of the money that was handed out over the years in scholarships. Mr. Dare passed away in 2014. He left just enough money to fund scholarships for two more years - 2014 and 2015.

Please note that benevolence offerings have never funded Synod scholarships.

With the Eastern Synod Scholarship fund now exhausted, we will only be able to award a few scholarships annually from the remaining funds, Spencer-Barche and Murray. Glebe counselling centre continues to grow

Near-daily news coverage of mental health concerns has planted the importance of emotional well-being firmly into our national consciousness.

So it's little wonder that the Delton Glebe Counselling Centre, a community outreach project by the seminary, continues to grow. On average, each month more than 140 clients receive counselling at the centre to strengthen their **emotional and spiritual well-being**.

Named in honour of the late Rev. Dr. Delton Glebe, who served as professor and seminary principal-dean, therapists at the centre are specially equipped to address clients' concerns from a spirituality perspective if the client chooses. The centre offers counselling for individuals, couples, families, children and

groups. It also offers play and art therapy. Clients mainly come to the centre to seek help dealing with anxiety, depression, relationship issues and addictions.

The centre also supports many people who have suffered trauma as children. The centre operates out of a home at the corner of Albert Street and Seagram Drive in Waterloo.

The Eastern Synod, which owns the building, has partnered with us by providing the space at no cost beyond the seminary's

initial outlay of \$100,000 for renovations, plus ongoing maintenance.
